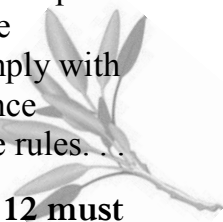


We are a working farm. To keep everyone safe while you are visiting, please help us comply with our very reasonable insurance provider by following these rules. . .



- ☞ Each child under age 12 must be accompanied by at least one adult to assure that child's safety.
- ☞ Do not enter a building unless a staff member is present.
- ☞ Stay behind all barriers and guard rails at all times.
- ☞ Do not go into the pastures to pet or feed the animals.

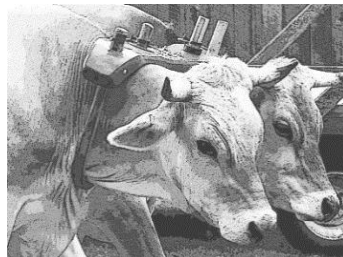

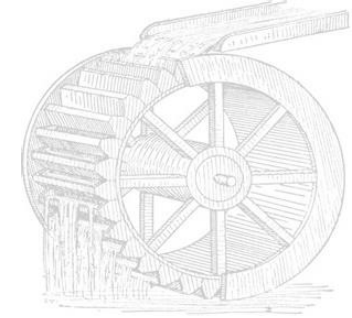
